My first year of residency at Henry Ford in Detroit, Michigan was one of the worst years of my life. My program director at the time was everything a program director should not have been. 

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example, there were residents prior to me who had problems with him and were petrified to speak about the situation. There was a resident after I left who tracked me down because he was also having problems and asked me if I would be willing to go to court against the director. It was brutal, and no one wanted to be associated with his new target, me. I was stuck. If I was fired, all of my hard work would have been for nothing, and my dream of becoming a doctor would be over; because of one man who had no right being in a leadership role. I could not continue. He was actively intimidating me and I was having nightmares and panic attacks. I was granted a medical leave, and by some grace, found another program. The director was reported to Graduate Medical Education (ACGME) and while an "investigation" was carried out, they



did little to protect me personally. So, I dedicate this podcast to that director, Dr. Deepak Prabhakar, the ACGME, those who turned a blind eye, and all the other atrocities that taint the practice of medicine, squelch spirits, and are the very antithesis of healing. Because without them, I could not have transcended them. And as Dr. Chouman wisely states in this interview, "If every life choice that was bad got me to where I am today, then so be it. I'll live with that. I'm really happy now."
